# HOW CAN I GET SOME PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE?

A degree on its own is generally not enough to land you your dream job. Practical experience is critical, not only to give you the qualifications you need to be competitive, but also to help you better understand your own interests, skills, personality and work values so that you can be confident that your next career step is the right fit for you.

There are a number of ways for you to get some real-world experience and information about potential careers related to Forensic Psychology. These include:

**Practicum** – Placements with community organizations are offered to a limited number of fourth-year Social Science and Humanities students. The Pre-Practicum Process begins in third year.
